During summer we celebrated the 100th at camp a few different times! We had 100th Anniversary baseball hats that every camper and staff was given to help kick off the festivities.

In July we opened the 100th time capsule that has been in the rafters of the Dining Hall since the summer of 1999. Campers and staff from the summer, as well as alumnae from the 75th Reunion all contributed to the time capsule. The Section heads from Summer 2024 opened the trunk and unfortunately discovered that a mouse had gone through its entire life cycle while making a home and eating most of the contents of the time capsule... the smell was something else! In August we did a full camp birthday party! We brought back a ton of activities and games that we found in the archive videos of camp through the years. We took the afternoon off and had different groups of campers create a float out of a canoe. For Evening Program, we had different stations that campers rotated through that were all previously played and popular games. We played:

- Canoe Tug-of War (Sitting back to back on the gunnels of a canoe and paddling forwards, trying to get the canoe to paddle further onto your side)
- Canoe Fill (trying to fill your canoe by splashing water in it before the other team does)
- Night at the Races (Different races like 3-legged race, wheel barrow race etc.)
- "June Junes off the Cliff" (throwing jujubes to a camper jumping off tower and they try and catch it!)
- Water balloon toss
- Whipped Cream (throwing whipped cream in the air and trying to catch it in your mouth)
- Tug of War
- Smartie/flour game (Hiding smarties in a bowl of flour and campers have to blow on the flour to find the Smartie)
- Slip n/ Slide
- Letters to future selves for a new time capsule!

We displayed the contents that survived the time capsule mouse in the Dining Hall for campers and also played all the archival videos that were restored for campers throughout the day. To end the night, we did a parade of all the Canoe floats in the shallow end, followed by a fireworks show!

During Vespers we also created a 100 out of wood and lit it on fire out in the lake during candle kissing.

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The Ripple Effect Capital Campaign

In celebration of Camp Oconto's 100th Anniversary in 2024, the Oconto Campership Fund was thrilled to launch The Ripple Effect: a special capital campaign. The campaign goal is to raise \$1,000.000, which will form a permanent endowment funding consistent, dependable campership opportunities — ensuring that generations of girls, from all backgrounds, have the chance to experience the magic of Oconto.

The Oconto Campership Fund (and the Ripple Effect Campaign within it) is a Registered Canadian Charity, # 889022398, entirely separate from Camp Oconto.

For more than three decades, the OCF supported campers through need-based financial assistance, however the need is growing exponentially, and Camp is out-of-reach for too many. The Ripple Effect is designed to stabilize and expand the possibility of camperships for the decades ahead. By establishing well-funded capital, yielding reliable revenue, the OCF will be able to help qualified campers to attend Oconto—thereby welcoming both returning and new campers into the Oconto family.

We are extremely happy and proud to announce that alumnae have already contributed an incredible \$115,000 toward our initial alumnae goal of \$200,000. Your generosity is already making a significant and meaningful difference in the lives of girls and young women- we are incredibly grateful to everyone who has donated. This early support strengthens and validates our campaign and will be the foundation for The Ripple Effect Campaign's broader outreach to corporate and foundational donors – planned for the next year, as it seeks larger-scale contributions to attain the ultimate goal of \$1 million in total capital contribution commitments. BUT! We're not there yet—we still need your help.

If Oconto has shaped your life or holds a special place in your heart, now is the time to pay it forward. Your donation will ripple outward, giving future deserving campers the opportunity to grow, laugh, explore, and thrive in the same magical setting we all hold dear. And as you know, when you make a Camp Oconto experience possible for a girl, you help to produce a remarkable and amazing woman of the future.

Together, we can and will create lasting change—and ensure that the Oconto experience continues to inspire girls and young women for the next 100 years.


